In the matter of claim of (1) George Pouchot father of Louis Pouchot late private Co. E. 33<sup>rd</sup> Regt Ohio Vols  
of (2) Wheelerburg, County of Scioto, State of Ohio  
for (3) person as Dependent father  
personally came before me a (4) Deputy Clk Com Pleas Court in and for  
aforesaid County and State (5) James L Taylor  
of Wheelerburg, County of Scioto, State of Ohio  
who, I hereby certify, is a respectable and credible person, and who, being duly sworn, declares in relation to

the aforesaid claim, as follows: (6)  
I, James L Taylor, resident of Wheelerburg Ohio  
being in my 42<sup>nd</sup> year, do hereby certify that I  
have been acquainted with George Pouchot claimant  
No 245 85<sup>th</sup> as father of Louis Pouchot Co. E. 33<sup>rd</sup> Ohio Vols  
who died or was killed in the service of the U. S. and all  
with his family and circumstances since the war since  
being a near neighbor a part of the time, and one of his  
daughters being in the employ of the family where I was  
my house I know from personal observation that he was  
was subject to periodical attacks of insanity  
the year 1864 and from thence, and that she was thereby  
incapacitated from taking care of the family. This attack  
of insanity was so marked as not to need medical  
skill to detect the mental aberration, she would some  
times leave home and with difficulty be induced to  
return. George Pouchot prior to & during the war possessed  
no property, to my knowledge, and no income except what  
he and his family could earn, I also know that the  
family seemed to be in extreme poverty and to lack  
the necessaries of life. The girls were put out to sew on  
wh. l. very young, and out of a stipend of 75 ct per week  
they - at least one of them - contributed a good share of  
this to the support of the family. The other boys at that time  
(except Louis) were too young to earn wages. I further know  
that the wife of George Pouchot is still living and a few  
years since inherited a few hundred dollars from the father's  
estate. It is not known to what extent Louis Pouchot contributed  
to the support of the family, but always heard that he helped  
them.

I further declare that I have no interest in said claim, and am not concerned in its prosecution.
